- Amateur Bicycle League of America (ABL of A) State Representative of the ABL of A for 25 years, as well as Member, Board of Directors serving in the capacities of Secretary, Vice-President and President, and earned the designation of Lifetime-Member in 1958, following his tenure as President.
- Chester Nelsen's other cycling contributions include; a Presidency of the St. Louis Cycling Club (one of the oldest clubs in America), being a charter member of the Cycling Memorial Association, and a Program Director in Cycling for the Boy Scouts of America.
- Winner of seven Missouri State Titles and a silver medal in the 1935

JIM RABDAU

- 1984-2002, Founder and Executive Director, International Women's Challenge multi-day race; historically, the longest running stage race in North America. Also known as the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge, the PowerBar Women's Challenge, and Hewlett-Packard Women's Challenge.
- Established a new benchmark for equality between men's & women's racing by creating a challenging multi-day stage race for women; This despite the refusal of the UCI to sanction the race on the grounds that it was too tough for women (they eventually sanctioned it in 1995).
- Invented the innovative head-to-head time trial format with a reverse order general classification start, in which two riders go off at 30-second intervals and racers compete in side-by-side pairs

PETER RICH

- 1971, created the first International stage race in the US, the Tour of CA.
- 1956, organized the Berkeley Wheelmen, AKA the Berkeley Bicycle Club.
- 1957, Produced what is now the second oldest road race in the U.S, the Berkeley Hills Race.
- 1962-65, Member ABL, Board of Directors, with his mission to help update the type of events held at ABL Nationals, and with considerable success.
- 1960's, organized and sponsored several annual Cyclo-Cross races, in Tilden Park including a National Cyclo-Cross Championship.
- 1962-present, owner-operator Velo Sport (bicycle store). After being mentored as a young racer by the likes of Oscar Junor and Spence Wolf, he decided to open a bike shop in Berkeley at the age of 21. Bicycle frames, women's bicycles, men's and women's touring and racing bicycles, as well as hybrids, mountain and children's bicycle, were created and sold from Velo Sport.
- Organized first meetings Grizzly Peak Cyclists 1969
- Organized first meetings of East Bay Bicycle Trails Council 1982

Contributor Category

TOM RITCHEY

- Built his first road frame at age 17, and raced it to numerous victories.
- By 1976 he was one of the first US frame builders producing work that was as good as anything coming from Europe. This put US bike builders on the map in a way they hadn't been before.
- 1979 Produced the first production mountain bikes (Ritchey Mountain Bikes) while working with Gary Fisher. He helped established the commercial viability of the mountain bike, advanced frame design & geometry, and redesigned nearly every component on the traditional bicycle to optimize it for the new sport of mountain biking
- Pioneered the use of fillet brazing for high end racing frames, allowing for more design options than lugged construction offered at the time. This helped pave the way for the mountain bikes, oversized tubing, non-traditional geometry and a litany of other advancements.
- Generated key design elements still in use today including the threadless steer tubes/stems (1972), force directionally butted tubes, oversized steel frame tubing, vector-based off-road tire tread designs (now widely used), and early 29er designs (mountain cross, flat bar off-road bike w/wide 700c knobby tires) before such a thing existed.
- Helped grow the sport of MTB racing through support of young racers such as Don Myrah, Ruthie Matthis, and Thomas Friscknecht.
- Helping to grow the sport of bicycle racing in Africa through his support of Team Rwanda, with the hopes of eventually giving African athletes a chance to compete on the international stage.
- Created several bike designs aimed at bringing affordable, practical cargo bikes to African communities currently lacking viable transit options for goods.
- Competed at a national level from a very early age, earning the nickname 'Senior Slayer' as a junior.

OSCAR WASTYN SR.

- Oscar, along with his father Emil, designed and built the first Schwinn Paramount bicycles.
- 1938 Oscar built Alfred Letournuer's Paramount that set the motorpaced world speed record of 108.92 MPH.
- Consultant to Frank W. Schwinn on both technical design and cycling industry issues.
- 1959 Officiated at the Pan-American Games held in Chicago.
- Official at the Humboldt Park, Northbrook, and Kenosha Velodromes during national & international events.
- Designed and built bicycles and components for many top amateur and professional cyclists including Ed Carfagnini and Marv Thomson.
- Master mechanic at 6-day races in Chicago, Buffalo, Cleveland, and New York.
- Started the Windy City Wheelmen and Lakeshore Wheelmen bicycling clubs in Chicago
